City Finances:

Envision Franklin is a planning commission document not a BOMA document. A new proposed version is coming out in the next few weeks and I will be very interested to see what staff is proposing.

2. For new development, how do you think the additional infrastructure (water, sewer, roads, police, ambulances, fire, etc.) should be funded?

Franklin has adopted impact fees to require new development to pay its way. These should be regularly reviewed. Some are being reviewed at present.

- 3. Some citizens have expressed concern that the building in which City Hall resides is no longer adequate. What are your thoughts? Plans are already underway to construct a new city hall. This will be a major project money-wise and time-wise.
- 4. What are your views concerning Franklin giving tax breaks to attract new businesses? **Only extraordinary** businesses should get tax breaks. The national headquarters for Nissan is a good example. IN-N-OUT BURGER is opening their first eastern territory office in Franklin.

Public Issues:

 No. Events held in Franklin at public venues must follow the State of Tennesssee Code of Decency.
